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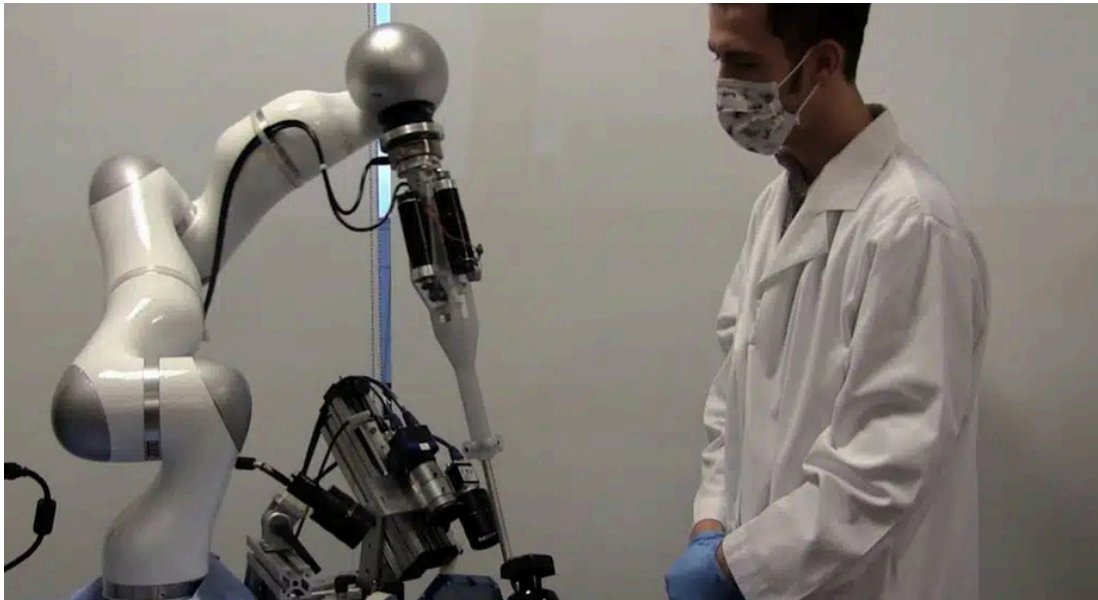


Game-Changer: The Weight Loss Drug Revolution

INDIA'S GENERIC SURGE: JAN AUSHADHI SAVINGS HIT ₹15,000 CRORE

The government's Jan Aushadhi Kendras have significantly expanded access to affordable generics, increasing their market share to about 7% by FY 2024–25. This initiative has led to substantial savings for patients, amounting to approximately ₹15,000 crore in the last financial year alone.
